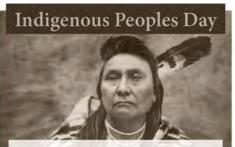

**Indigenous Peoples Day is a holiday** that honors the history and culture of Native Americans and their resilience against colonization and oppression.

For only the second time, a U.S. president has officially recognized **Indigenous Peoples' Day** 

President Biden first issued a proclamation recognizing the day in 2021.

The proclamation was issued on Friday October 10, as a day to honor Native Americans, their resilience and their contributions to American society throughout history, even as they faced assimilation, discrimination and genocide spanning from generations. The move shifts focus from Columbus Day, the federal holiday celebrating Christopher Columbus, which shares the same date as Indigenous Peoples' Day this year.

### Monthly Eligibility Reports—(MER)

**MER's are due on the 1st of every month and no later then the 10th of the month. If the 10th falls on a weekend, they're due** the Friday before. If a MER is not received by the 10th, it will not be considered for *Early Cash Aid* processing and will automatically be processed as *Late Cash Aid*. Anything received after the 10th is considered late, and it must reach our office before the 30th or 31st by 4PM or your case will close.

Early Cash Aid—aid received on the 1st of each month.

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Late Cash Aid-aid received on the 10th of each month.

Please complete MER's with all necessary paperwork. Incomplete MER's will be immediately returned to you requesting the missing documentation. If you receive Child Support payments, please make sure you give us a copy of your child support payment or if you have received a gaming distribution check or income tax return; that too will need to accompany your MER, (in most cases).

If you have any activities that require signature for events or activities you volunteered with, please get the signature so that the hours count. If you have any questions, please feel free to give us a call.

### Immunizations and School Enrollment Please bring in updated immunizations and School

### Breast Cancer Awareness Month. held in October every year, aims to promote screening and prevention of the disease, which affects one in eight women in the United States every year and 2.3 million women worldwide. Known best for its pink theme color, the month features a number of campaigns and programs conducted by groups ranging from breast cancer advocacy organizations to local community organizations to major retailers — aimed at supporting people diagnosed with breast cancer, including metastatic breast cancer, educating people about breast cancer risk factors, stressing the importance of regular screening, starting at age 40 or an age that's appropriate for your personal breast cancer risk.



Parents, school staff, and other caring adults have a role to play in preventing bullying. They can:

Help kids understand bullying by talking to them about what it is and how to stand up to it safely. Tell kids bullying is unacceptable. Make sure kids know how to get help. Keep the lines of communications open. Check in with kids often, listen to them. Know their friends, ask about school, and understand their concerns.

Encourage kids to do what they love. Special activities, interests, and hobbies can boost confidence, help kids make friends, and protect them from bullying behavior. Model how to treat others with kindness and respect.

Kids who know what bullying is can better identify it. They can talk about bullying if it happens to them or others. Kids need to know ways to safely stand up to bullying and how to get help.

## Non-Recurring Short Term Benefits

Have you recently experienced an emergency crisis or natural disaster situation? If so, OVCDC, may be able to assist in the short term.

### Tribal TANF Non-Recurring Short Term Benefit **Mission Statement**

We are a dedicated American Indian organization operating under a consortium of Sovereign Nations. OVCDC is providing the opportunity for improvement in the quality of life by focusing on education and self-sufficiency while protecting, preserving, and promoting our cultures in the spirit of positive nation building for Native people of today and tomorrow.



#### 173-2 Non-Recurring Short-Term Benefits

The purpose of non-recurring short-term benefits is to provide eligible needy American Indian/Alaska Native families assistance to meet extraordinary needs that arise from an emergency, crisis situation, natural disaster or an episode of need beyond those intended to be covered by regular monthly assistance and/or supportive services.

In order to be eligible, families must meet the following eligibility criteria:

1. Have a current TANF Intake Application on file.

2. Have a total verified family income equal to or less than 300% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines.

3. Provide verification of the specific crisis and demonstrate an established need for the short term benefit be requested. Examples of short term benefits include but are not limited to:

• Short-term mortgage or rental assistance for families who have lost their home to a natural disaster or lost employment due to a communicable disease pandemic.

• Costs associated with virtual learning for families who have lost employment due to a communicable disease pandemic.

- Short-term utility and energy assistance to families who have lost employment due to natural disaster.
- Clothing allowances for families who have lost their possessions due to a natural disaster.
- Family support services to deal with traumatic events such as a natural disaster or communicable disease pandemic.
- 4. Emergency assistance will not exceed 4 months from the start of the crisis situation.

TANF applicants may be eligible to receive a lifetime limit of up to \$5,000 per assistance unit based on the episode of need and reasonable cost to meet the established need.

Non-recurring short term benefits are subject to change as funding permits.
